Teaching Science as Investigation: Modeling Hands-on, Minds-on Strategies

Workshop emphasizes integration of curriculum, collaborative instruction, and cooperative group learning. It focuses on constructivist approaches, best teaching strategies, and inquiry-based activities for teaching science to middle/secondary school students.

This workshop focuses on teaching science as investigation: hands-on/minds-on inquiry-based science as described by the National Science Education Standards (NSES). It integrates science content and pedagogy in a manner consistent with inquiry.

You will learn how to present content that supports a student’s need to understand science concepts and how they learn these concepts. Inquiry-based science strategies that encourage teachers to teach science as inquiry productively will be used.

This workshop helps teachers work with students who present behavioral, emotional, and psychiatric disorder traits, or with students who have mild to moderate cognitive impairment. For these students, many behaviors, referred to as neurological based behavior (NBB), are outside of their control and they are unresponsive to normal behavior management techniques, leaving some teachers feeling powerless.

Students with NBB do not respond reliably to normal discipline strategies. This workshop provides increased understanding of students within this disability area and suggests a range of strategies for use in a mainstream setting.

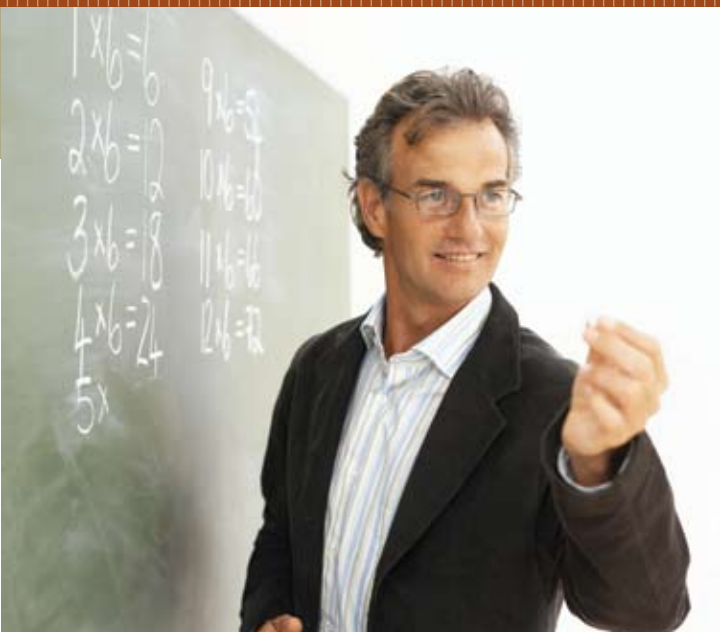
Prerequisite: A brief online learning lab must be completed sometime between June 1-30.
